The Foundation Stage Curriculum

Our Nursery and Reception children follow the Foundation Stage curriculum in our Early Years Unit. All the children have access to the same areas in the Early Years Unit throughout the day. They are taught in their different age groups when we come together for group sessions. We promote a positive approach to learning through play in a warm and supportive environment. Our teachers plan together, to ensure that all the children are offered a wide range of opportunities suitable for their stage of development.

In Foundation Stage, we spend a lot of time making sure that children feel settled, safe and secure. By valuing each individual child's emotional needs, we ensure they can achieve their full potential. Through child-initiated play and adult-led activities, we explore the areas of learning.

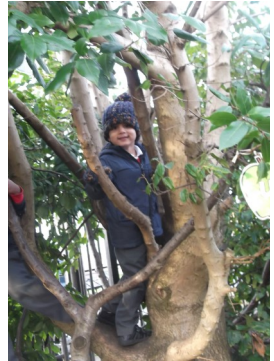

Recording your child's achievements

The Early Years Foundation Stage staff aim to work in partnership with parents, and build on the very valuable learning that takes part in the home. Clothing (Reception)

For boys, our uniform consists of navy blue trousers, a white shirt/polo shirt, a red jumper/sweatshirt and black shoes.

For girls, our uniform consists of a navy blue skirt/pinafore, a white blouse/polo shirt and a red jumper/sweatshirt/cardigan.

School sweatshirts can be purchased from the office.

PE Kit (Reception children only)

Children will need shorts and a T-shirt for PE lessons. School PE kit can be purchased from the office.

All clothing should be named, including hats, clothes and shoes.

Clothing (Nursery)

Encourage your child to recognise and manage his/her own clothes. Please make sure that any removable items of clothing (hats, coats, jumpers etc.) are clearly named.

It is easier for your child to go to the toilet if trousers do not have belts and if they have an elasticated waist rather than buttons or zip fastenings. Likewise, we recommend shoes with a Velcro fastening rather than buckles or laces. School sweatshirts can be purchased from the office.

Children who are toilet trained before starting nursery may have an accident occasionally. You can hang a change of clothes for your child in case of an accident on his/her coat peg.

We have a small stock of clothes in school and we ask that you will wash and return any clothes as soon as possible.

Outdoor Play

Your child will have the opportunity to play and learn outside. Your child will need to bring suitable clothing for the weather each day.

Children should not wear jewellery for school and if they wear earrings they must be studs.



Books

Please enjoy books and stories at home just for fun. You can borrow books free of charge from the local library. You may borrow a book from our home loan box any time too.

Nursery children will bring a book to share at home once a week.

Reception children will bring home a reading scheme book once a week to support the teaching of reading. Please do share this at home, and write in the reading diary.

We value your contributions.



Healthy snacks

As part of the School Fruit and Vegetable Scheme, your child will be given a piece of fruit or vegetable every morning, free of charge. All children also receive milk every day. Children have individual water bottles available throughout the day. Please do not send other drinks or snacks.

School Meals

All infant children are eligible for a free school meal. You can opt to send a packed lunch if you wish. Meals must be ordered one week at a time so if school meals are ordered on a Monday they must be taken for the whole week or if a child is having packed lunch on a Monday then he/she must have packed lunches for the whole week.



Outings

During the year, your child will have the opportunity to visit a variety of places in the local area and further afield. As these outings are very valuable experiences for the children we hope that we will be able to count on your support.



Safety at home-time

It is an education authority rule that children are brought to school and collected by a responsible adult. Please do not ask older brothers or sisters who may be in school or secondary school to bring or collect your child. The person collecting your child must be aged 14 or over.

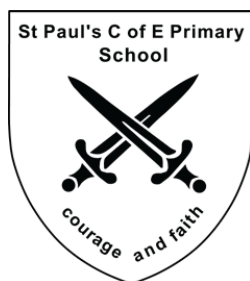
Please let us know if you give permission for someone else to collect your child and when that person will be collecting him/her.

Please make sure that you collect your child on time, as children often become very upset when their parents are late. If you are delayed in collecting your child, please try to telephone the school to let us know approximately when you will be arriving so that we can reassure him/her that someone is coming and when they will arrive.

Illness

Please do not bring your child to school if he/she is unwell. Inhalers and EpiPens can be administered in school and other medicines can be administered with parental permission.

Please let us know who we can contact in case of illness or an emergency and keep this information up to date.



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
