Class: 1/2		Title: The Great Fire of London		
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Topic summary: The Great Fire of London started in the early hours of the morning of the 2nd of September 1666, in a baker's shop on Pudding Lane. By September the 5th, the fire had destroyed more than 13,000 houses and buildings in the city, including 87 churches and St Paul's cathedral. The fire spread quickly, destroying most of the buildings in its path. The way houses were built, the lack of an effective and organised firefighting service and the weather in the days before, all played their part in this terrible event.

History Objectives	Unit of work end points
 Ask questions such as: What was it like for people? What happened? How long ago? Use artefacts, pictures, stories, online sources and databases to find out about the past. Identify some of the different ways the past has been represented. Describe significant people from the past. Recognise that there are reasons why people in the past acted as they did. Place events and artefacts in order on a time line. Use dates where appropriate. Show an understanding of concepts such as civilisation, monarchy, parliament, democracy, and war and peace. 	 Place life events in chronological order on a timeline Describe how the fire started and why it is a significant event Place key events from the fire on a timeline Compare and contrast Samuel Pepys's accounts of the fire with other historical sources Suggest who was to blame for the disaster and use evidence to explain why Investigate the effect the fire had on people's daily lives
